



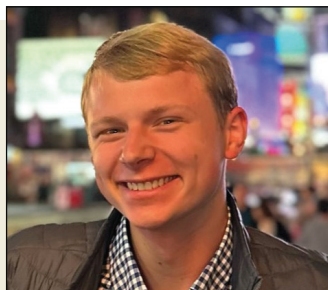
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Carroll Junior Find His Career Passion in Physical Therapy

Luke, a native of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, has been accepted into the university's highly regarded Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) program.

This is a significant milestone in his journey toward a career in pediatric physical therapy.

Inspired by his own recovery process, Luke now hopes to make a difference in the lives of children facing medical challenges. His dream is to work at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin to help kids recover from injuries and surgeries. He's particularly interested in working on the fifth floor where the MACC Fund Center supports children undergoing cancer treatment. "I want to help kids improve their quality of life, especially those dealing with long-term effects post-chemotherapy," he says.

Currently majoring in exercise science, Luke will begin the graduate program in the fall of 2025, with plans to complete his undergraduate degree in the spring of 2026 and graduate with his DPT in the spring of 2028. Luke first learned about Carroll University as a high school junior and was immediately drawn to its health-care-focused academic programs and close-knit campus environment. One step of her transformation came when the senior from Kenosha was hired as a resident assistant (RA), following the path of her freshman year RA who encouraged her to consider the role.

"My freshman year I never stepped outside of my room," Lauryn says. "I was scared. I was nervous. My RA, Bella Westerholm, pushed me outside my comfort zone. She was a role model, a very important person who helped me get where I am today."

Now she plans to enter the police academy and eventually become a detective.

"Her class helped me figure out the difference between a career and a vocation," says Lauryn. "I love watching documentaries on criminal justice with my mom and understanding why people commit crimes and how people go about solving them. I feel called to work in that field."

program allows students to complete three years of undergraduate coursework followed by three years of graduate study, with the first year of the DPT program charged at undergraduate tuition rates.

"Without the financial aid I've received, I probably wouldn't have been able to come here," he says. Lakeland recruited Lauryn in high school to play basketball for the Muskies. She attends Lakeland thanks to a financial aid package that includes funds from the Wisconsin Grant Program as well as Lakeland's Ulrich Scholar program.

"I didn't want my mom to have to focus on the cost of college because she has two others at home that she needs to focus on," Lauryn explains. "I can focus on my education and athletic career because I don't have that in front of my face. I can focus on graduating."

Her campus involvement is significant. She is a senior RA, a key member of the women's basketball team and a Blue & Gold Champion helping new Lakeland University students. She co-chaired the annual Blue & Gold Awards that recognize students and organizations. Her efforts have been noticed. Lauryn won a 2025 Lakeland Student Advocates award, a 2024 Demonstrating Excellence award, and was named a 2023 Emerging Leader. She's also received a Lakeland Community Service Award for mentoring and is a multi-time Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference Scholar-Athlete Award winner.
